The Fifteenth Heavy Artillery Regiment, which is composed almost entirely of Germans, was raised in this city, and left for the seat of war in July, 1863, and did garrison duty in the forts near Alexandria until March, 1864, when they joined the Army of the Poto-mac, and were assigned to the First Brigade, Second Division, and Fifth Army Corps, participating in the following battles:
