

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## **REPORT OF THE ADJUTANT GENERAL**

### ALBANY, January 1, 1932

His Excellency FRANKLIN D. ROOSEVELT, Governor of New York, Albany, New York.

SIR:—Herewith is submitted the report of The Adjutant General of the State respecting the administration of the Division of Military and Naval Affairs of the Executive Department for the year 1931.

## NATIONAL GUARD

The strength of the active National Guard on this date is 1,393 officers, 21 warrant officers and 19,575 enlisted men. The report of the Commanding General, National Guard, is attached hereto as Appendix A.

## NAVAL MILITIA

The strength of the active Naval Militia on this date is 119 officers and 1,601 enlisted men. The report of the Commanding Officer, Naval Militia, is attached hereto as Appendix B.

## **Reserve Components**

National Guard Reserve.—The strength of the National Guard Reserve on this date is 291 officers and 1,244 enlisted men.

State Reserve List.—The strength of the State Reserve List on this date is 418 officers.

State Retired List.—The strength of the State Retired List on this date is 193 officers.

Independent Organizations.—The recognized independent military organizations of the State have an active membership on this date of 645 officers and other ranks.

## NEW ARMORY CONSTRUCTION

During the 1931 session of the Legislature, appropriations were<br/>made and approved by Your Excellency in the sum of \$519,000<br/>for armory construction, as follows:New Field Artillery Armory, Peekskill......\$315,000<br/>200,000New Naval Militia Armory, New Rochelle.....200,000<br/>200,000Survey plans, etc., for:<br/>New Infantry Armory, Jamestown......2,000

New Field Hospital Čo. Armory, Corning...... 2,000

On May 6, 1931, the armory of the 106th Field Artillery, Buffalo, was totally destroyed by fire. Temporary quarters for the regiment have been rented in the City of Buffalo, preliminary sketches for a new armory are being prepared and if funds are made available the reconstruction of this armory will be started in the spring.

The corner stone of the new Field Artillery armory at Newburgh was laid by Your Excellency on October 23rd of this year. This building covers every possible requirement for a field artillery armory.

The construction of the new Field Artillery armory at Kingston is progressing.

Contracts have been awarded for the new Field Artillery armory at Peekskill and the new Naval Militia armory at New Rochelle.

Tentative sketches for the proposed new armories at Jamestown, Corning and Binghamton have been approved. The sites for these three armories have been approved.

### EXPLANATION

Details with respect to requirements indicated above, are as follows:

Buffalo.—106th Field Artillery. At present occupying rented quarters. This organization has been organized for a great many years. A modern armory should be constructed for this organization at a cost of \$1,000,000.

*Binghamton.*—Present structure built in 1904 is 27 years old. Originally constructed to accommodate a regimental headquarters, one unit of infantry and one unit of field artillery. At present occupied by battalion headquarters and three units of infantry and battalion headquarters and three units of field artillery. Has no accommodations for animals. Stables are rented for this purpose at a cost of \$1,800 per annum. It is estimated that a new armory could be erected at a cost to the State of \$250,000 which would provide adequate quarters. Jamestown.—Present structure built in 1892 (is 39 years old). Originally built for one infantry unit. No accommodation for present day field equipment. So located that enlargement is impossible. Location poor for military purposes. A new armory should be provided at a cost of \$250,000, plus cost to county for land.

Corning.—Present structure rented and inadequate for proper training of a medical unit. An armory should be provided at a cost of \$200,000, plus cost to county for land.

Schenectady.—Present structure built in 1897 (is 34 years old). Originally built to accommodate two infantry units. At present occupied by battalion headquarters and four units of infantry. It is estimated additions could be made which would provide adequate quarters at a cost of \$300,000, plus cost of additional land by the county.

While the location of this armory is ideal from a military standpoint, it may be found expedient to procure a new site containing ample ground for outdoor drill. In such a case additional funds may be procured through county agencies.

Utica Infantry.—Present structure built in 1894 (is 37 years old). Originally built to accommodate two infantry units. At present occupied by battalion headquarters and three infantry units. It is estimated that additions could be made to this armory which would provide adequate quarters at a cost of \$200,000, plus cost to county for additional land.

Syracuse Artillery.—Present structure rented. A battery of field artillery organized in 1911 has occupied the Arena building at a rental that has increased from \$3,500 to \$9,500. A modern armory should be built for this unit at a cost of \$300,000, plus cost to county for land.

*Ticonderoga.*—Present structure rented and inadequate for proper training of a medical unit. An armory should be provided at a cost of \$200,000, plus cost to county for land.

*Middletown.*—Present structure built in 1890 (is 41 years old). Originally built for one infantry unit, now occupied by two units of field artillery. Has no accommodations for animals. An addition to this armory should be provided at a cost of \$100,000.

Mount Vernon.—Present structure built in 1898 (is 33 years old). Originally built for one infantry unit. At present occupied by a battery of field artillery. Has no accommodations for animals. Is the smallest State armory and entirely inadequate for present day requirements. A new armory should be provided at a cost of \$300,000.

Poughkeepsie.—Present structure built in 1891 (is 40 years old). Originally built for one infantry unit. At present occupied by a battery of field artillery. Has no accommodations for animals. A new armory should be provided at a cost of \$300,000.

Geneseo.—The armory facilities for a troop of cavalry are adequate, but the stable for the housing of approximately 75 animals is of wood construction, and is a fire-trap. A new stable should be provided at a cost of \$75,000.

*Rome.*—Present structure rented and inadequate for proper training of a medical unit. An armory should be provided at a cost of \$150,000, plus cost to county for land.

Rochester Cavalry.—Originally built for a troop of cavalry. At present occupied by regimental headquarters and two cavalry units. It is estimated additions could be made that would provide adequate quarters at a cost of \$75,000.

Albany Infantry.—Present structure built in 1891 (is 40 years old). Originally built for a regimental headquarters, four infantry units and a signal unit. At present occupied by regimental headquarters, seven infantry units, a medical battalion headquarters, and one medical unit. It is estimated additions could be made that would provide adequate quarters at a cost of \$100,000.

Niagara Falls.—Present structure built in 1895 (is 36 years old). Originally built for one infantry unit. At present occupied by battalion headquarters, three infantry units and a division of Naval militia. It is estimated that additions could be made to this armory that would provide adequate quarters at a cost of \$50,000.

Dunkirk.—Present structure rented. A naval militia division in State service since 1912, has occupied part of a building which is inadequate for proper training. Naval Militia armories should be along shore. An armory and boat house should be constructed at a cost of \$200,000, plus cost to county for land.

## ARMORY MAINTENANCE FUNDS

The statutory requirements of chapter 558, Laws of 1913, under which all counties of the State outside of the city of New York are divided into two brigade districts, and the cost of renting, repairing, equipping. furnishing and maintaining armories outside the city of New York, is apportioned by The Adjutant-General among such counties according to the aggregate amount of assessments for each county within the brigade districts as fixed by the State Board of Equalization and resulted in the payment by these counties into the State treasury for the maintenance of armories in each of the brigade districts, of the following sums for the above purposes for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1932, and ending June 30, 1933:

Storage facilities are provided at the United States Naval Reservation, Sacketts Harbor, for material of the 13th Fleet Division, Naval Militia, and at Utica for units of the 10th Infantry.

Stables are provided at Binghamton for Detachment 104th Field Artillery at Kingston, Middletown, Mt. Vernon, Newburgh and Poughkeepsie for units of the 156th Field Artillery.

## ARSENALS, ETC.

The approximate valuation of military grounds and structures owned by the State and city of New York is \$34,218,893.

### FEDERAL PROPERTY AND FUNDS

From January 1, 1931, to December 31, 1931, 38,288 pieces of correspondence were received at the State Arsenal.

In connection with transportation of Federal property from the Arsenal to organizations throughout the State and to field training camps, 815 Government Bills of Lading were issued. Seven hundred eighty-three Transportation Requests were issued to cover transportation of troops to and from field training camps, special Service Schools and National Rifle Matches. Reports on issue of bills of lading and transportation requests are rendered monthly to the War Department.

Two hundred and two requisitions for State funds were issued to cover the several State obligations in the operation of the State Arsenal. Six hundred and seventy-five State vouchers were prepared and forwarded to The Adjutant-General for payment. One hundred and eighty-two State purchase orders were issued for miscellaneous supplies.

During the calendar year 1931, the Arsenal requisitioned, accounted for and shipped approximately \$2,000,000 worth of new Federal property to replace a similar amount of property rendered unserviceable through no fault of the New York National Guard and accounted for by 260 approved Reports of Survey and Included in the above, 556 Inventory and Inspection Reports. property valued at \$1,159,475.58 was destroyed by fire in the 106th Field Artillery Armory in Buffalo on May 6, 1931. Subsequently, the Federal Government through your Excellency authorized the United States Property and Disbursing Officer to drop said property from his accounts, upon the recommendations of the U.S. Surveying Officer, which automatically relieved the State of all responsibility for the destroyed property. The funds of the Militia Bureau and the allotment of Federal funds to the State for the replacement of property are very limited. However, with the whole hearted support of the Militia Bureau and from stock in the State Arsenal, property valued at \$665,620.92 has already been shipped to Buffalo. Every effort is being made to secure 31 Four Wheel Drive trucks valued at approximately \$90,000 without charge against the State's Federal allotment for shipment to Buffalo.

In connection with the accounting and shipping of the above property, 4,947 Shipping Tickets, 1,334 Memorandum Credit Vouchers and 1,274 Receiving Reports were issued by the Arsenal. This necessitated posting 7,709 vouchers to the Stock Record Account and Consolidated Memorandum Credit and Debit Account of the U. S. Property and Disbursing Officer.

A total of 2,000 requisitions were received from the several organizations of the New York National Guard which were edited and filled. Approximately 1,064 requisitions were made by the Arsenal on Federal depots for replacement of property and forage and bedding for animals.

All motor vehicles issued by the Federal Government to the State of New York are war time issue, were not received in good order and are inadequate for the military requirements of the State. They cannot be driven beyond a speed of fifteen (15) miles per hour without incurring danger from accident. We are endeavoring to secure a better type of motor vehicle from the Militia Bureau.

A total of 420 requisitions for motor transport supplies and equipment were filled. Seventeen (17) motor vehicles were overhauled for use at this Arsenal and camps of instruction and nineteen (19) for use by other units. Sixty-two repair jobs, such as body repairs, minor motor repairs, etc., were completed. Four (4) Arsenal trucks were changed over from solid to pneumatic tires.

### CLOTHING, EQUIPMENT AND SUPPLIES

The Federal military equipment and munitions in the possession of the various National Guard Organizations and in storage at the State Arsenal or at the Camps of Instruction within the State on this date have a value of approximately \$17,500,000.

All organizations of New York National Guard are fully uniformed, armed and equipped for active service in the field. The following is a statement of unserviceable property dropped by reports of survey and Inventory and Inspection reports for the fiscal year 1931:

### DECORATIONS AND SERVICE MEDALS

Under the provisions of G. O. 10, A. G. O. 1894 the State has issued to the Officers and Men of the National Guard and Naval Militia, decorations as follows:

Medal for Valor: For acts of valor performed by officers or enlisted men of the National Guard or Naval Militia. To date twelve of these decorations have been issued.

Under the same and subsequent authority, the State has issued to its Commissioned and enlisted personnel, decorations for long and faithful service as follows:

For 35 years service 47 issued.

For 25 years service 1,011 issued.

For 20 years service 1,498 issued.

For 15 years service 2,838 issued.

For 10 years service 7,385 issued.

Conspicuous Service Cross: This decoration authorized by chapter 627 of the Laws of 1920 is presented to any citizen of the State who, while serving with New York troops, or with the Allied armies, shall have been cited in orders emanating from the Headquarters of a Brigade or higher Military or equivalent Naval unit. To date 2,159 Crosses have been issued.

The State has also authorized the following medals commemorating active service:

Spanish-American War, Philippine and China Campaign, 10,255 awarded.

Mexican Border Service, 9,000 awarded.

World War, 15,000 awarded.

State service, guarding public utilities, 3,000 awarded.

## PENSIONS AND CLAIMS

During the year seven claims were adjusted for pay and care of soldiers and sailors injured in line of duty.

There are 63 persons receiving military pensions on this date. Since last report three pensioners of this class have died and four new pensioners have been added to the list.

## BLIND VETERANS FUND

There are at this date 101 war veterans who receive \$500 per annum, for permanent and total disability, by reason of loss of sight. Since last report one blind pensioner has died and 29 new pensioners have been added to the list.

## VETERANS' RELIEF BUREAU

The number of applications for relief to date total 9,901; of this number 4,296 have received the sum of \$250, the maximum permitted under present law.

Under chapter 589, Laws of 1922, \$1,000,000 was appropriated for the bureau. In 1923 under chapter 326 another million dollars was appropriated. Of this total, \$68,891.29 reverted to the State Treasury through lack of reappropriation, leaving a net balance to the bureau of \$1,931,108.71. Under chapter 708, Laws of 1931, \$75,000 additional was appropriated, making the gross total available \$2,006,108.71.

Actual payments for relief of sick and disabled veterans to date amount to \$1,678,668. Expenses of relief commissioners and administration to date are \$254,841.79. The expendable balance is \$72,598.92, of which amount the sum of \$41,835.84 is in the hands of the Commissioners.

Previous statutory provision gave The Adjutant General authority to grant an extension of payments in specially needy cases to the extent of an additional \$250, under which provision 157 received an additional payment of \$250. This authorization was stricken from the law in the 1931 enactment.

The bureau is represented by a resident commissioner in each of the assembly districts throughout the State. The commissioner makes the necessary investigation to determine the eligibility of an applicant to be given relief. He prepares all papers, makes the relief payments, renders the periodical reports and returns, and discharges the multiplicity of duties that must necessarily result from the position.

These men serve without pay; they give their time and efforts to the work without recompense, and altogether are rendering a service to the State of a high patriotic value.

## SOLDIERS' BONUS BUREAU

Under constitutional authority a bonus for New York veterans of the World War was provided pursuant to chapter 19, Laws of 1924. The sum of \$45,000,000 was realized from the sales of bonds authorized by law, this sum having been augmented by premiums amounting to \$659,565, the latter sum also being appropriated for bonus purposes under chapter 208, Laws of 1925.

A Commission, consisting of the Adjutant General, the Comptroller, the Treasurer and the Attorney-General, administered the disbursement until April 22, 1926, when its functions were absorbed by the Adjutant General.

Each eligible veteran, upon application, received the sum of \$10 for each month of service with the colors between April 6, 1917, and November 11, 1918, with \$150 as the maximum payment. Under chapter 209, Laws of 1925, an additional appropriation of \$2,500,000 was made. Chapter 26, Laws of 1925, added the next of kin to those who were killed or died in the service or prior to February 28, 1924, as eligible to receive the bonus. Under chapter 267, Laws of 1926, a further appropriation of \$300,000 was approved. Chapter 676, Laws of 1931, extended the time for filing claims to July 1, 1932, and made an appropriation of \$250,000.

At an extraordinary session of the Legislature of the year 1931, to carry out the provisions of an act creating a temporary emergency relief administration, and making an appropriation for its work, the sum of \$584,000 was appropriated by chapter 799 for the payment of bonuses, \$30,000 of which was made available for administration expenses, bringing the total amount for bonus payment to \$49,293,565, out of which there has been paid to December, 1931, in bonus and administration costs the sum of \$48,845,159.61, leaving a balance of \$448,405.39.

Under the original law, no claims could be received after May 1, 1927. Since the reopening of the Bureau on April 23, 1931, thousands of applications and letters requesting application forms have been received, many unsettled claims have been reopened, while 5,206 legitimate claims have been recorded to date. Over 15,000 veterans who made a former claim, but who apparently forgot the transaction, have been notified that they were formerly paid.

There has been received to date a total of 423,145 claims, of which 408,741 have been paid with an average payment per claim of \$117.68 at an overhead cost of \$1.74 per claim, which is less than any other State has as yet reported. There are still in process of adjustment 7,398 claims of which 5,616 are in the Bureau and 1,782 in the hands of the claimant. Of the total claims received, 23,842 applicants are not credited as having actual residence in the State at the time of their enlistment. Adding this number to the 518,864 who were credited to the State, it would appear that there are still 119,561 New York State veterans who have not applied for the bonus.

## Annual Report of the New York Monuments Commission

The report of the New York Monuments Commission for the Battlefields of Gettysburg, Chattanooga and Antietam is as follows:

The commission is authorized to determine the positions and movements of the New York organizations engaged in battlefields of the Civil War, and to erect, in commemoration of their services, such monuments, markers and tablets as may be required from time to time, pursuant to acts of the Legislature of this State.

The present members of the commission are: Charles A. Shaw, U. S. V. (veteran of the Civil War), and Major General Franklin W. Ward, The Adjutant General, J. W. Lynch, secretary.

## Examinations of Enlisted Men for Admission to the United States Military Academy

The Annual Competitive Examination for enlisted men of the National Guard for cadetships at the United State Military Academy was held, under the direction of this office, at New York City, Albany and Buffalo on November 13 and 14, 1931.

Forty candidates competed. The eight having the highest average of proficiency have been selected, by Your Excellency, to take the entrance examination on March 1, 1932, and, if successful, will enter the Academy on July 1, 1932.

The practice of alloting these cadetships to soldiers of the National Guard was authorized by Congress May 4, 1916, and since that time the manifest interest throughout the National Guard in this splendid educational opportunity has constantly increased.

Eligibility for appointment requires the candidates to be between the ages of 19 and 22 years, an enlisted man of a Federally recognized unit of the National Guard, who served as a soldier therein not less than one year prior to date of entrance into the Academy.

## APPENDIX A

### **Report of the Commanding General, New York National Guard**

The following report on the affairs of the New York National Guard for the calendar year 1931, is made in accordance with paragraph 6, Military Regulations No. 80, State of New York.

1. General. I consider that the New York National Guard, as it stands today, is in healthy condition, that existing deficiencies are recognized and are in process of correction, and that with the present spirit that exists still higher efficiency can and will be In considering our operations for the past year three attained. salient points stand out-a very remarkable stability in strength, figures of attendance that surpass even the very high records of recent years, and a distinct advance in training methods. We were again fortunate in the fact that your Excellency was able to make several visits to our training camps and that we were able to show our troops also to the Lieutenant Governor and many other representatives of the State and of municipalities. A number of representatives of the U.S. Army and of foreign governments also visited our camps and armories and expressed their approval of our troops, training and plants.

Our average strength for the year has exceeded 2. Strength. 21,000, with a high mark of 21,491 in June and a low of 20,889 in February. This is a variation of only 602. Our maximum strength, is allowed by the Militia Bureau, is 21,483, and, in order to keep within the Bureau's allotment, we were obliged to suspend recruiting from June 15 to September 15. This indicates to me a very satisfactory condition. It may possibly have been influenced by existing economic conditions and the desire on the part of some men to obtain even the small amount which is allowed for pay, but I like to believe, and do believe, that the main reason is that our National Guard service is attractive and interesting and that the right class of men wish to join our ranks. At any rate, it seems apparent that our authorized figure can be maintained without difficulty, and that instead of fearing to drop below our minimum requirements we shall have to watch our strength carefully so as not to exceed our maximum. The problem of recruiting is not now a National Guard or an organization problem, but a unit or com-Some units may have trouble for individual pany problem. reasons, but these cases can be and are handled by regimental commanders, and no regiment or separate organization at present is a source of worry with respect to its ability to maintain its required strength.

3. Attendance. The attendance at the armory inspection last spring was 93.90. Our attendance figures for field training at our

summer camps were far ahead of any ever before attained. 20,294 attended camp, and only 1,011 were absent therefrom, a percentage of 95.25. Our attendance for all duties for the entire year A very handsome trophy presented in memory of was 86.10. Colonel H. Hines, former commanding officer of the 105th Field Artillery, for the highest combined attendance at armory drills, inspection and field training, was awarded this year for the first time, although the period of competition terminated September 30, 1930, and was won by the 102nd Medical Regiment with a percentage of 94.11. For the second year, terminating September 30, 1931, it has been won by the 27th Division Aviation. With the remarkable figure of 97.49. The 258th Field Artillery was second in both years. In 1930 the 212th Artillery was third; in 1931, the High attendance, besides being an evidence of 71st Infantry. interest and good morale, is important from the training standpoint. A man cannot be trained if he is irregular in his attendance. Our attendance figures indicate that we are getting full value out of our training programs.

4. Organization. Early in the year I recommended a reorganization of our signal troops, which was put into effect and which has produced excellent results. In accordance with this plan the 27th Division Signal Company was transferred from Brooklyn to Yonkers, and Company "B" of the 101st Signal Battalion was transferred from Manhattan to Brooklyn. Captain Gorman, formerly of the 27th Signal Company, was promoted to Major and placed in command of the 101st Signal Battalion, relieving Major Otto, who applied for retirement, and Lieutenant Linehan of the 102nd Motorcycle Company was promoted to Captain and placed in command of the new 27th Division Signal Company. Both of these officers have done splendid work and deserve great credit for the efficiency which they have already established in their new commands.

Last summer I felt obliged, as the result of a special investigation, to recommend to your Excellency the removal of Colonel Thomas Fairservis from the command of the 106th Infantry and from the New York National Guard. This was done, and Col. William R. Wright, my Chief of Staff, was assigned to the temporary command of that regiment. I am glad to be able to report that this regiment is at present in good condition and operating in a very satisfactory manner. In a short time I expect to be able to designate a permanent commanding officer.

In the near future certain minor changes in the 156th Field Artillery, which are recommended by Colonel Cassedy, will be sent to the Adjutant General for the necessary action.

Colonel Frederick W. Baldwin, commanding officer of the 14th Infantry, reached the legal age limit of service last year, after long and efficient service in the New York National Guard, and was retired by your order as a Brigadier General. He was succeeded by Lieutenant Colonel William R. Jackson of the same regiment, and officer of ability, experience and long service. Colonel Herman A. Metz, State Quartermaster, and Lieut. Colonel William E. Downs, 212th Artillery (AA), were also discharged during the year upon reaching the age limit of service. In recognition of their services they were also, by your orders, advanced one step in rank and retired respectively as Brigadier General and as Colonel.

In these three officers the State has lost three able and faithful servants of high character and efficiency. The National Guard has been fortunate in that it has been able to use their abilities for a long period. It is also fortunate in that it can fill their positions with other officers of an equally high type.

5. Service in Aid of Civil Authorities. I am glad to report that there have been no calls upon the National Guard during the past year for active service in aid of civil authority. Our plans for such service have, however, been carefully checked over, and special training has been given under the direction of Major Alfred D. Reutershan, Assistant G-3 on my staff, to prepare for such an eventuality. I believe that we are well organized to meet any call.

In the matter of unemployment relief, we have had several calls. Our policy has been to operate through municipal governmental agencies, to comply at once with requests from such sources, and to refer calls from outside sources to them for their approval. This policy has worked well. It has afforded relief where needed and obviated the operation of scattered and ill-organized projects. Relief work was performed, in some cases for considerable periods of time, in the armories of the Headquarters Troop, 51st Cavalry Brigade in Staten Island, the 165th Infantry in New York, the 27th Special Troops in Yonkers, 156th Field Artillery in Middletown, and the 108th Infantry in Rochester. The National Guard is ready and able to render increased assistance during the coming winter if such assistance is needed.

6. Training. I consider that the year 1931 showed a distinct advance in our military training. Under the direction of Colonel Alexander J. Macnab, Senior Instructor, U. S. Army, and Lieutenant Colonel Hampton Anderson, Assistant Chief of Staff of the New York National Guard, a new system of instruction was worked out for our field training season and for the year, which produced excellent results. Stress was laid particularly upon small arms firing under combat conditions and upon the thorough training in marksmanship of new men. In addition to the actual marksmanship, this course was designed to increase training in the leadership of junior officers and of non-commissioned officers. The cavalry had similar training, and the artillery and aviation continued the practical work that they have been performing for some years. Command Post exercises were required of all staffs, including the weeks' exercise performed by the 27th Division Staff. In these exercises the work of headquarters troops was especially commendable. In the Division staff exercise especially, signal, military police and motorcycle and other special troops showed an excellent understanding of their required duties and

very capable performance thereof. Chemical warfare instruction was continued and was extended this year to include troops at stations other than Camp Smith. Our general system of instruction is well standardized and well understood. It is producing good results, and advanced instruction will be added as we find that we can assimilate such instruction. Division Communications and Chemical Warfare Schools were operated successfully and profitably with enlarged scope, while officers', candidates' and noncommissioned officers' schools are required throughout the Guard and in general are well conducted. The candidates' schools. where enlisted men are prepared for commission in their own organizations, I regard as specially important. We should be self-supporting insofar as is possible, and every recruit should feel that the door to advancement in the service is open to him if he displays the necessary qualifications and is willing to do the required work.

7. Small Arms Practice. Owing to reductions in ammunition allowances and the subsequent necessity of reducing preliminary practice and to the increased time given to collective or combat firing, small arms qualifications for 1931 showed a decrease. I do not feel, however, that this is any cause for alarm. Our percentage of qualifications is still far above that required by the Militia Bureau. and our system of instruction is excellent. I believe that for the men who had previously qualified we were too severe in eliminating preliminary practice entirely, and that with slight modification our present plan will produce higher results next year. Of the infantry, the 10th made the best combined record with all weapons, closely followed by the 108th and 107th. The 27th Tank Company, training at Fort Meade, made an exceptional record with the pistol, qualifying 30 experts, 15 sharpshooters and 15 marksmen, for a company percentage of 93.7. The Militia Bureau requirement is 30 per cent.

Through the partial completion of the range at Pine Camp we were able to give our New York City cavalry a chance for rifle practice for the first time in many years.

In order to allow more time for artillery practice at camp, we are permitting some of our artillery troops to qualify with the pistol at home station. Both for artillery and pistol instruction I believe this to be good practice.

The annual State matches in conjunction with the New York State Rifle Association were held at Camp Smith in June and produced keen competition and excellent scores. While the greater share of the major trophies fell to the team of the 102nd Engineers, a good distribution of the trophies was secured, which will increase interest in the future.

Rifle and pistol teams were also sent to the National competition at Camp Perry, and while they won no major competition they performed very creditably and secured a good share of individual medals. With a little additional financial support, which I believe to be necessary, there is no reason why the highest national honors should not be won by our State teams. At present they are handicapped in competing with teams from other states which allow pay and expenses for more practice than we can afford from our present available funds.

8. Athletics. No innovations have been made this year in athletics, but interest has been continued. The Wadsworth Trophy for baseball was again won by the 212th Coast Artillery, with the 165th Infantry in the runner-up position. In track athletics conducted by the Military Athletic League, the Novice meet was won by the 165th Infantry, with the 245th Artillery second. The Josephthal relay trophy was won by the 245th Artillery. The championship meet was won by the 107th Infantry, with the 102nd Engineers second.

No basketball tournament was held this year, but one is contemplated for 1932.

The 101st Cavalry is active and successful in indoor polo, while the horse artillery is specially interested in mounted basketball.

In addition to the above general activities practically all units are active in inter-company and inter-regimental athletic competitions, especially in basketball and indoor baseball, and several have entered teams in recognized amateur leagues.

The financial side of soldier boxing suffered from the general depression, but was successful in several localities and was conducted on a high plane of honesty and efficiency under the supervision of the State Athletic Officer, Lieut. Colonel Joseph A. S. Mundy. Soldier boxing, when properly conducted, interests our personnel, provides a means of earning a livelihood for some of them, and draws the public to our armories. If conducted at a profit it provides funds for legitimate organization expenses. We are not pushing the establishmentof soldier boxing. Where it is desired we are regulating it and requiring that regulations be complied with to the letter. Where thorough cooperation in this respect is not given we are eliminating it.

9. Inspections. Armory Inspections, conducted in conjunction with the Federal Inspections, showed a satisfactory condition. Reenlistments in 1930 numbered 3,374, as against 3,316 in 1929. Per cent present for inspection .939 (in 1930 - .928). Commencing this fall, a new system of State armory inspections has been inaugurated, and while the inspection of the entire New York National Guard under this system will not be completed for some time to come, enough has been covered to show that it is practical and more satisfactory than our former method. Under the old system, dating back to long before the World War, the State Inspecting Officer accompanied the officer designated by the War Department for the annual Federal Armory Inspection, and, due to the fact that the unit had been advised of the date of the coming inspection some months previously and that the scope of the inspection was designated by the Federal Inspector, it was extremely difficult to obtain a picture of the conditions normally obtaining. The present system provides for State Inspection under a schedule approved by the

Commanding General, of which a unit is advised only enough time in advance to permit the making available to the inspector of the records, etc., which he may require. Thus a true picture of normal conditions is obtained, and with no advance schedule published it is possible for the inspector to make his inspection thorough and unhurried. This presents another advantage over the old system, which required that armory inspections, in order to comply with Federal Regulations, must all be covered in the period January 1st-May 31st. With the Field Training period commencing in June, a crowded schedule was of necessity followed, with resultant hurried inspections. The new plan contemplates that these armory inspections will cover administration thoroughly and exhaustively, and that State inspections of training will be conducted during our field training encampments.

The accounts of the Quartermasters at Camp Smith, Pine Camp and Fort Wright were inspected at intervals throughout the field training period and checks made of the presence of men whose names appeared on the payroll. The payrolls of the Construction Department at Camp Smith were also verified from time to time. Post Hospital, Headquarters Mess and the Provisional Ordnance Detachment accounts at Camp Smith were audited periodically.

Twenty special investigations were made and reported upon during the year.

10. Uniform and Equipment. Two organizations-the 14th Infantry and the 258th Field Artillery-have been added during the year to the list of those equipped with distinctive full dress At the recent celebration at Yorktown, Virginia, all uniforms. regiments equipped with dress uniforms were represented by detachments, and the result as to appearance and condition of uniforms and equipment was very satisfactory. A complete issue of melton uniforms was recently made to the New York National Guard, and has greatly improved the appearance of the troops. Other issue uniforms are not entirely satisfactory, being of the old high-collar style and of rather inferior make. The Militia Bureau of the War Department hopes in the near future to remedy I feel, however, that in general our uniform, equipthis defect. ment, and consequent appearance improve every year. A splendid piece of work was performed by the U.S. Property and Disbursing Officer, Colonel W. A. Taylor, with the assistance of the Militia Bureau, in completely and immediately re-equipping the 106th Field Artillery, who had lost all of their effects in the destruction of their armory.

11. Permanent Plant. (a) Armories. The State suffiered a serious loss this year in the total destruction by fire of the armory of the 106th Field Artillery in Buffalo. This was one of the largest and finest armories in the country, and its loss was a heavy blow. The 106th Field Artillery, commanded by Colonel Douglas P. Walker, has shown exceptional morale in recovering from this blow without loss of spirit or efficiency. Temporary quarters were promptly secured for them by the Adjutant General; they were promptly supplied with new clothing and material by the U.S. Property and Disbursing Officer, and they have been operating extremely well in spite of their loss. It is hoped that some means may be found to place them in new and permanent quarters at an early date. In other respects we have been most fortunate in the progress made in armory construction. Work has been started on the much-needed armories at Newburgh and Kingston, and work on the new Peekskill armory will be started soon. Bids for the new armory for the 104th Field Artillery at Jamaica were opened this month by the Armory Board of the City of New York, and it is hoped that material progress thereon-if not completion thereof -can be reported next year. The steelwork for the completion of the 369th Infantry in New York City has been erected, and it is expected that this armory will be completed next year and will be one of the finest in the State. Special need still exists for new construction or remodelling at Poughkeepsie, Mount Vernon and Middletown, all of the 156th Field Artillery, for the 104th Field Artillery and 10th Infantry at Binghamton and for the 102nd Medical Regiment at Ticonderoga and Corning, together with some other stations where the need is not so pressing, but still worthy of consideration as early as convenient. Armories in general are well kept and well used.

(b) Camp Smith. 1931 was an excellent year for construction at Camp Smith. Congress voted an emergency appropriation for construction at National Guard field training camps, and, after some special effort, New York received its full share. I believe that I should mention the extremely valuable assistance rendered in this connection by U. S. Senator Royal S. Copeland, who was untiring in his efforts to secure a just share of these funds for our With these funds seventeen new mess halls were built and State. the camp is now equipped with concrete block mess halls through-A new and modern sewerage disposal plant is practically out. completed, and will be in use next year. A complete combat range was hastily constructed in the spring, was used all summer, and has been completed with concrete and permanent construction this fall. A new thousand-inch machine gun range was built, and the camp now affords facilities for forty-eight machine gun targets. New target houses were built at the old pistol range and the Valley rifle range, all Federally constructed buildings were repainted, and repairs to the stables are authorized for completion during the winter. State appropriations were sufficient only for normal maintenance and repair, with the exceptions that we were able to build three more streets of concrete floors and tent frames and to complete the Valley rifle range. Much important work in grading had to be put off for the future. From the profits from woodcutting a new wood yard was built, and canteen profits enabled us to install a complete and modern sound picture equipment in our recreation hall, which greatly added to the recreational facilities of the camp. A double handball court was constructed from Headquarters Athletic Funds, and was largely used throughout the summer.

(c) Pine Camp. At this camp, supported entirely from Federal funds, we were equally fortunate in securing necessary improvements. A brigade administration and mess hall and two new horse shelters were built, a utility building for the quartermaster, a wagon shed and a concrete floor in the gun shed; necessary repairs were made to the water and sewer system and the incinerator, many buildings were reroofed, and all buildings were repainted— the latter a great necessity and a great improvement to the appearance of the camp. The rifle range, although not yet completed, was put in such shape that it could be used for instruction practice, the aviation field was enlarged and improved, and the drill field and artillery ranges improved by further clearing. From canteen funds the recreation building was remodelled, and it is hoped that some plan may be worked out to obtain sound pictures for this camp as well as Camp Smith.

(d) Fort Ontario. At this post, a regimental camp on a Federal reservation, the enlisted men's shower and latrine building was enlarged and a new mess hall built in addition to the necessary maintenance and repair.

I believe that we have made material 12. Administration. progress toward rendering our publication, the "New York National Guardsman," self supporting, as outlined in my last report. The services of Lieutenant T. F. Woodhouse were secured early in the year, and I consider that he has done excellent work in improving the magazine, increasing its paid advertising, and decreasing the cost of production. While we have not yet reached our goal we are making good progress. The Post Hospital at Camp Smith continues to support itself except as to the pay and subsistence of the permanent summer staff; the canteen at Camp Smith not only supports itself, but furnished a considerable revenue for "permanent betterments" at the camp. The canteen at Pine Camp is self-supporting, but not yet producing the revenue that I hope for to provide additional recreational facilities at that camp. By our new system of State inspections I expect that inspectors will have the time and opportunity thoroughly to investigate and correct regimental and company administration throughout the Guard, especially in finances and property accounts.

We have experienced during the year the usual efforts on the part of the "Young Communists' League" to foster dissatisfaction and unrest in our ranks. These efforts are handled quietly and effectively by the commanding officers concerned, and the malcontents who have gained admission are quietly eliminated without publicity. The Guard as a whole is sound and contented, and such work within the Guard is conducted by a negligible few who far from represent the general feeling.

In view of the general unemployment and unrest I consider that our record for the year has been remarkable. All organization commanders are endeavoring to take care of their unemployed men in all ways that they can.

# APPENDIX "A;" ADJUTANT-GENERAL'S REPORT

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We recently had a disagreement with the sheriff of Bronx County on the subject of military prisoners. While we were carrying out the law, and while our actions were upheld by the court, I do feel that as few of our men as possible should be actually sent to jail for any but the most serious offenses, and while I feel that the situation has generally been well handled by our officers and that only a very small percentage of our offenders receive such sentences, I am working at present toward devising some plan of handling the question of necessary discipline without appeal to the civil branch of the law. I believe that a satisfactory solution-one that would be a decided benefit-can be reached. In connection with this and the subject immediately preceding I feel that our attendance percentages and the fact that for three months last summer we had to suspend recruiting in order not to exceed our authorized allotment, are irrefutable indications that our National Guard service is attractive and that our men are happy and contented in the service. For the future I hope for a continuance of this spirit, for still further improvement in training and equipment and for the same cooperation and assistance that we have received in the past from the Federal government and the State. I believe that no state in the Union supports its Guard more than does the State of New York. I know that the Guard appreciates that support, and I believe that it is worthy of that support.

# **APPENDIX B**

# Report of the Commanding Officer, New York Naval Militia

1. In accordance with provisions of paragraph 6 R-80, Regulations Military Forces of the State of New York, the following report of the affairs of the New York Naval Militia for the calendar year 1931, is submitted.

2. Strength. The strength of the New York Naval Militia as of December 1, 1931, is 1,751 as compared with 1,977 on December 1, 1930. This loss in strength is due entirely to the disbandment of the Aviation Squadrons which became necessary and was effected November 30, 1931, with regret.

The 1931 average attendance at drills was 71 3. Attendance. per cent as compared with 73 per cent in 1930. The attendance at the Annual Muster and Inspection for this year was 88 per cent, in comparison with 82 per cent in the previous year. Personnel not present in prescribed uniform at 8:30 p.m., the time set for muster, were not recorded as present at annual muster. The very slight decrease in general attendance can be attributed to the abnormal period we have been going through. Men have lost employment and in rehabilitating themselves in some cases were not immediately able to be as regular in their attendance upon drills as desired. Were we to consider in figuring the attendance percentage only those men receiving Federal drill pay, it is estimated that an attendance of better than 90 per cent of this classification would obtain. Secondly, it is believed that personnel in a non-pay status are largely responsible for bringing down the general average. The increase in strength for Annual Muster under the present rigid rules for recording PRESENT would indicate the continued improvement in calibre of personnel and their interest in the duties required in the Naval Militia. It must be given consideration that only 55 men in each fleet division receive Federal drill pay and in the case of Marine Corps companies Federal drill pay has been completely abolished.

4. Small Arms Firing. The small arms competition for the figure of merit produced 172 marksman qualifications in 1931, as compared with 256 for the previous period. This decrease in the qualification of marksmen can well be attributed to some very unfortunate weather conditions. Members of the Naval Militia are allowed but one day to engage in small arms firing. The ranges are secured will in advance and must be used without regard for weather conditions. There was an increased attendance during 1931 for this practice. 1,100 men fired as compared with 991 during 1930. The average figure of merit for all units was 52.9 per cent for 1931, as compared with 60.6 per cent in the previous

year. There was an increased participation of teams in the State Matches. The Brigade Match was again won by the Third Battalion against representation from each command eligible to compete. The 32nd Fleet Division, with a total score of 606 won the Headquarters Match. The 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Battalions furnished competitors for the Cruickshank Trophy, Rogers All Comers and Wingate prizes. In each of these matches the scores were an improvement over the previous year.

5. Training Duty. Practically 100 per cent attendance was realized on men allowed to participate in the annual 15-day training cruises of the New York Naval Militia during the months of June, July, August and September on the U. S. S. Wyoming and destroyers of the training squadrons. It is indeed possible that a greater number of our men would cruise if it were not the policy of the Navy Department to limit the number of officers and men from each unit. This policy is based mainly upon appropriations and is unlikely to be changed in the near future. The cruising vessels visited foreign ports during the training duty and this innovation was enthusiastically accepted by both officers and men. The New York Naval Militia has sought the foreign cruise for several years and it was indeed gratifying to have the full recognition by the Navy Department of our representations. During the cruises gunnery exercises were held and two guns crews from each division of the New York Naval Militia fired Modified Short Range Battle Practice, during which, in the case of the destroyers, the ships were entirely controlled by Naval Militia Officers. The performance of training duty in a battleship was indeed beneficial to those so detailed in that it tended to broaden the perspective of both officers and men and offered greater opportunity for close instruction work while on board.

6. Week-end Cruises. Some of our units were unable to participate in these voluntary duties to some extent this year because of the unavailability of vessels due to the naval economy program. There was, however, a great deal of valuable training procured in this manner throughout the organization, which was accomplished by interchange of use of floating equipment by units having ships with those not similarly so fortunate. There were several voluntary periods of training duty of thirty days or longer duration which our officers and men were authorized to perform without pav. In many instances, on account of unemployment, the performance of such duty was a relief to the individuals and resulted in valuable training for those who participated. A greater amount of small boat work was engaged in this year. This is excellent training in that it is conducive to self-reliance and better seamanship on the part of enlisted personnel.

7. Armories. Through funds generously made available a very handsome boathouse was completed and placed in commission at Buffalo, New York, early this year. This building, located as it is on the waterfront, is a valuable facility for the Naval Militia. As a result of recognition by the Adjutant General of the need for an armory at New Rochelle, the construction of a very practical structure was recently initiated. In this case also waterfront property in the rear of the building makes this an excellent site.

8. Naval Academy Appointments. Two members of the New York Naval Militia won admission to the United States Naval Academy during the year 1931. Seventeen men were appointed to the academy out of a total of 25 appointments for the entire Naval Reserve throughout the United States. The successful candidates from the New York Naval Militia were:

The desirability of these appointments continues to be forcefully brought to the attention of our units and is used extensively for recruiting purposes.

9. General Efficiency of the Brigade. The Annual Merit Ratings by the U. S. Naval Reserve Inspection Board of the Naval Reserve of the entire United States shows the following for units of the New York Naval Militia:


